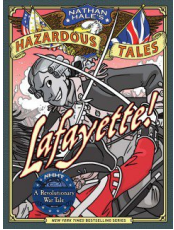


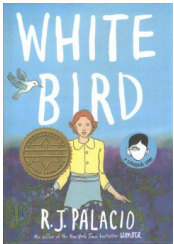
Catherine's War

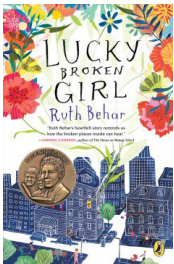
Lafayette! : A Revolutionary War Tale

Tells the story of the Marquis de Lafayette, both what happened before and during the American Revolution, including all the Frenchman's escapades across France and the colonies.



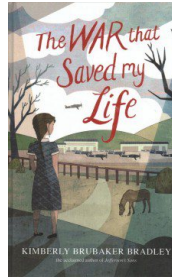
White Bird : A Wonder Story

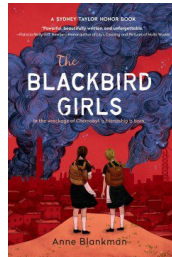
Lucky Broken Girl

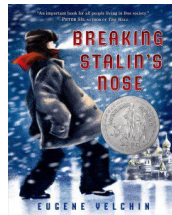
The War That Saved My Life

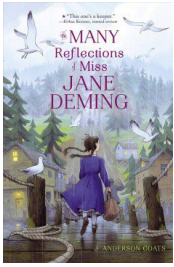

by J. Anderson Coats

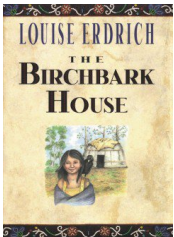

by Sharon M. Draper

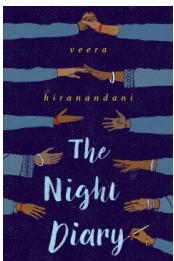

by Louise Erdrich

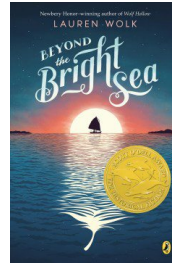

by Lauren Wolk

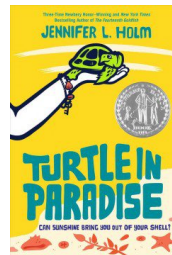
Set adrift on the ocean in a small skiff as a newborn, twelve-year-old Crow embarks on a quest to find the missing pieces of her history.

by Erin Entrada Kelly

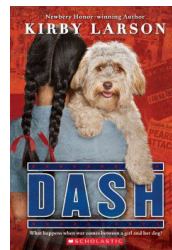

by Jennifer L. Holm

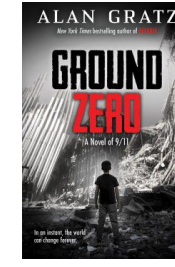

by Kirby Larson

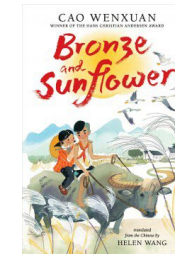

by Alan Gratz

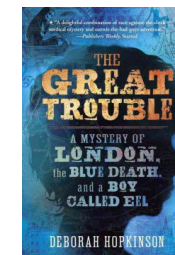
